Thompson Guild's annual Tree of Lights event took place on the evening of Monday, December 2nd. Thompson Health President/CEO Michael F. Stapleton, Jr. commented on the Tree of Lights tradition and what it means to remember friends and family. Thompson Guild President Taryn Windheim thanked the many contributors, and Chaplain Mark Henson from Thompson Health gathered all in attendance for a prayer to bless the tree. More than 100 members of the community and the M.M. Ewing Continuing Care Center residents attended the ceremony.

Those in attendance were treated to entertainment at a reception in the M.M. Ewing dining room. More than 30 members of the Canandaigua Elementary School 5th Grade Chorus, under the direction of Bill Mehls, sang holiday songs for the crowd. The Thompson Toners, who also are residents of M.M. Ewing, delighted the crowd with holiday music directed by Anitra Kelly. Thompson Bear and Santa helped to round out the evening's festivities.

In all, more than 500 people were recognized at this event, either in memory or in honor. Those recognized will have their name added to the Tree of Lights commemorative book. The Tree of Lights event raised more than \$5,500 this year. The Thompson Guild will use the funds to fulfill its mission of helping Thompson Health purchase needed equipment throughout the year.

Springtime in Canandaigua

Everyone's invited to what's becoming one of the Guild's most popular events – Springtime in Canandaigua, a three-day fundraiser beginning on Friday, April 25 and continuing through Sunday, April 27. This year's juried art and craft show, the third annual, will once again take place at the Canandaigua Civic Center.

The fundraiser's 2014 beneficiary is Thompson's new Women's Health and Wellness Center. The innovative \$2.5 million facility will create a patient-centered continuum of care currently unavailable in the Finger Lakes Region. The Guild's volunteer efforts will help Thompson offer health care specifically designed around a women's optimal breast health and bone wellness.

We applaud the 100-plus volunteers and Guild board members who donated their time to last year's Springtime event, and truly appreciate the community's tremendous support. Many thanks to our Springtime in Canandaigua Committee members: Dawn Case, Kathy Connor, Edythe Gansz, Judy Hanley, Cindy Hept, Krista Jackson, Drinda Lofton, Karen Lustick, Joe Matus, Lou Loy, Rosemary Park, Lynne Standish, Suzanne Winslow and Taryn Windheim.

With two years of solid attendance – Springtime in Canandaigua attracted more than 7,500 patrons during its first two years – the 2014 numbers are expected to grow. Combined, the 2012 and 2013 events raised \$23,440 for Thompson Health.

More than 60 artisans will return this year and about 30 new and exciting artisans will introduce their talents to our patrons. We've heard from artists from Michigan, Vermont, Maine and surrounding states. Professional speakers will also be invited to explore springtime topics such as landscape architecture, organic gardening and improving your outdoor living space. The forums will be held at the Civic Center and are free to the public.

Our Gold Sponsors include Lyons National Bank, Constellation Brands, Wegmans Markets and Thompson Health. Additional support is also in place from Canandaigua National Bank, Heritage Motors, Case's Liquor, Reliant Credit Union, and Ontario County Work Force.
